## Pause for Prayer, 26th June 2020

On 6th March some of us met in church to take part in a service prepared by the women of Zimbabwe under the auspices of the World Day of Prayer. The theme was 'Rise! Take Your Mat and Walk', based on the reading from John's Gospel, Chapter 5:

Now in Jerusalem by the Sheep Gate there is a pool, called in Hebrew Beth-zatha, which has five porticoes. In these lay many invalids - blind, lame and paralysed. One man was there who had been ill for thirty-eight years. When Jesus saw him lying there and knew that he had been there a long time, he said to him, "Do you want to be made well?" The sick man answered him, "Sir, I have no one to put me into the pool when the water is stirred up; and while I am making my way, someone else steps down ahead of me." Jesus said to him, "Stand up, take your mat and walk." At once the man was made well, and he took up his mat and began to walk.

The congregation was asked to reflect on the following questions:

- Where in our lives and communities do we need to hear Jesus' life-changing question: "Do you want to be made well?"
- What are the obstacles or excuses that hinder our transformation?
- What does "Rise! Take your mat and walk" mean for us?

and then everyone present was asked to make commitments to support our communities with actions of love, peace and reconciliation.

How timely these commitments were made in view of the fact that, unbeknown to us at the time, in the space of 17 days afterwards, normal life, as we knew it, came to an end with the imposition of the lockdown in an attempt to stop the spread of the coronavirus!

Also, how apt the commitments were, with the overwhelming majority using words like

support others (neighbours, work colleagues, young people) pray for others to be a good friend and neighbour caring listening make time for prayer and bible reading more visible in the community for good helping each other patience inclusivity

At the end of the service invitations were issued to discuss these commitments and pray about them during the Pause for Prayer slot on 27th March but that, of course, did not happen.

Let us pray now for ourselves, the troubled, reconciliation and all those affected by Covid 19.
